Make Affordable California Again

Californians Legal Safety Superior Court Justice

Protect families. End courthouse clubs. Restore equal justice.

MACA will make California courts safer, more affordable, and more transparent by ending fake emergency tactics, courthouse-club influence, secret internet evidence, and insider advantages that make families feel justice is out of reach.

- 1. No ex parte without serious emergency.** MACA will require a seven-part emergency test: sworn facts, real notice, clear harm, no delay tactic, narrow relief, verified evidence, and a public record explaining why emergency action was needed.
- 2. Strict county bar conflict policy.** When a case is in court, judges and appearing lawyers must not use County Bar Association roles, meetings, events, or committees to create private access, influence, or an appearance of bias.
- 3. 99-mile cooling-off rule for courthouse insiders.** Former court administrators, prosecutors, district attorneys, law-enforcement attorneys, and similar courthouse officials should not practice as attorneys or private investigators in the same county; they must move at least 99 miles away. Stop Same family members same county as Judge, District Attorney, Prosecutor, Californians are frustrated.
- 4. No same-county judicial appointment from local insiders.** Attorneys, courthouse administrators, prosecutors, and courthouse-connected officials should not be appointed as judges in the same county where they built local legal power; they must serve at least 99 miles away.
- 5. Court cases must be decided by the case record. No Google searches, AI tools, internet findings, search-engine results, or outside online documents should decide a case unless properly disclosed, authenticated, admitted, and tested under court rules.**
- 6. No internet dragnet by law enforcement.** Police, sheriffs, and law enforcement must not pull private, scraped, purchased, or unverified internet information against Californians without lawful authority, documented source, and accountability.
- 7. End the courthouse club.** County Bar Associations may educate the public, but they must never become courthouse clubs for private lunches, dinners, gifts, donations, golf-club settlements, or judge-lawyer influence outside open court.
